Marriage of Mr. Marks Miller to Miss Fannie Mittenthal at the Synagogue Sunday Evening.

Temple Emanuel was crowded to overflowing Sunday evening with the numerous friends and acquaintances of Mr. Marks Miller and Miss Fannie Mittenthal, to witness their marriage. The groom is a well-known young man who is exceedingly popular, not only among those of his faith but the public at large. The bride is the daughter of Mr. A. Mittenthal, of the old and well-known firm of A. & E. Mittenthal.

Long before the appointed hour, a large crowd collected in and about the synagogue, some forty or fifty being unable to get inside.

Promptly to the time the contracting parties stepped into the temple, followed by the attendants, Mr. N. Mittenthal and Miss Ettie Mittenthal, Mr. A. Ablowich and Miss Sarah Mittenthal; also the parents and grandparents of the bride. They marched down the aisle to the tread of a spirited march on the organ, by Professor Kessler, and were met at the altar by the Rev. Dr. Suhler, rabbi of the congregation, who greeted them with this blessing, spoken in Hebrew: "Blessed be you in coming in and blessed be you in going out."

The bride was attractively dressed in a lavender colored silk with princess overskirt. She wore a wreath of orange blossoms and a long silk illusion veil, and no ornaments. The two bride's maids were correspondingly dressed in fine white swiss, trimmed with white silk ribbon. They wore orange blossoms in their hair. The grooms were in full evening dress.

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The ceremony was then opened with a beautiful and touching prayer for the happiness and welfare of the young couple, which was delivered in English. The rabbi then delivered a few appropriate remarks, suitable to the occasion, which was listened to with marked attention by the large crowd present.

At the conclusion of the address to the couple before him and the congregation at large, the rabbi took a glass of wine and blessed it, after which the bride and groom tasted the wine. The formal questions customary on such occasions were then put to them first in English and then in Hebrew. Afterwards the groom put the ring on the bride's fore finger of the right hand, repeating in Hebrew after the rabbi, "Herewith I make you my wife according to the law of Moses and Israel."

Then followed the benediction, when the crowd left the synagogue to music on the organ, and the bride and groom were congratulated by their numerous friends.

Invited guests then repaired to Germania hall where a magnificent reception was given the principals. A splendid collation was served at the Delmonico restaurant, after which dancing was kept up at the hall till twelve o'clock when the many friends present bid "good night" to the happy groom and fair young bride.
